SYLLABUS

Timeline – minimum recommended 4 weeks; ideally over 8 weeks or semester Open to

- 1: Individuals any student can sign up and take this program independently.
- 2: Incorporated with an existing course, or as a credited course in Cultural Competency and Global Learning, or an interdisciplinary humanities course, or as a new program on global learning. Start and end time can be set by the college, and student group enrollment can be as individuals, or student registers with college and the college works directly to process the enrollment.
- 3: As a Continuing Education course
- 4: As an early college course

FAQs

What is needed from our faculty?

If your college offers this course in any capacity, it is useful for ISAI to have a point-person to bring it to the students, -we can report to regarding student progress and assessments, and we assume the college will want access to this information. But other than that, there is no extra work needed.

When can we do this?

You set the start and end date. There are fifteen lectures, we recommend a minimum of four weeks to take the classes, the ideal is probably an 8-week block or a 15-week semester.

What does it cost?

Funding has been made available to enroll 10 students (fully funded) or more than ten students (part funded) for the Fall 2021 semester for Texas Community Colleges. A discounted price of \$50 per student is also available once the funding has been used.

What credentials does your instructor have?

The main lecturer is Dr. Niamh Hamill, Ph.D. in Cultural History, director of the Institute of Study Abroad Ireland and Professor of Global Studies, Drew University NJ, and guest faculty include lecturers from University College Dublin, Quinnipiac University, Penn State, and exceptional guest speakers from a realm of Irish studies.

What are the student learning outcomes?

Investigate the world beyond their immediate environment, framing significant problems and conducting well-crafted and age-appropriate research.

Recognize perspectives, others' and their own, articulating and explaining such perspectives thoughtfully and respectfully.

Observe and evaluate the opinions and experiences of diverse audiences, with an awareness of geographic, linguistic, ideological, and cultural similarities and differences.

Engage in a personal way with the narratives and themes of each module and contribute creatively to an ongoing dialogue over the duration of the program.

Reflect critically on their role as a member of the global community and pursue ways to create positive change.

Modules

Each module contains the following components –

- 1: 25–40-minute video lecture introducing the topic & key concepts- focus will be on the module topic through the lens of Irish & European experience, and compared with the U.S. experience.
- 2: Animated 'fast facts' section on the topic
- 3: On-location sites and interviews relevant to the topic from a range of excellent guests.
- 4: Prescribed assignment to portfolio (can be compulsory or optional).
- 5: A recommended reading and resource list

Course Delivery

The program is available on the ISAI Learning Platform, which is usable by any enrollee on all devices. It can be always accessed, it is an asynchronous program, but we can release the lectures according to a timetable if required. Syllabus

1. Course Introduction by ISAI

General introduction to Ireland. Explanation of modules and how they will work, how assignments work – generally, they are optional for Continuing Ed students, and compulsory for all for-credit programs, but we work with each college and/or individual to decide. We strongly recommend, for maximum effectiveness, that everyone who engages with this program does an assignment per each topic.

Students also participate in pre-program and post-program survey, to provide data for the evaluation of this program. This survey was created with Dr. Melissa Whatley, a postdoctoral research scholar in the Belk Center for Community College Leadership and Research at North Carolina State University.

SECTION 1 HISTORY AND CULTURE

2. 'We all come from somewhere.'

Class Topic

Introduction to Ireland- overview of Irish History from Ice Age to present, focus will be on movement, migration and emigration, how we define identity, language and culture, our local and global neighbors and relationships.

<u>Assignment</u>—Students will film and upload one of the following to their portfolio.

1: 'My story' video – create a short video (2-3 mins) about your own family history - any information you have about any of your ancestors/family background, where your parents/grandparents came from, and why you are living where you are.

OR

2: 'Our story' video – create a short video (2-3 mins) about the history of your town or area, explaining when it was founded and why, any important or notable features of where you live, or any famous people associated with it.

OR

OR

- 3: 'Their story' video create a short video about anyone you know who came to the USA from somewhere else, where they came from, why they came, and how the experience worked out for them.
- 4: Create an image slideshow, audio file, original poem, original song or a piece of art based on any traditional folk custom or myth. Include your explanation of how your work was inspired and how it is representative of this theme.

3 Myth and Magic

Class Topic

Origin myths and stories of Ireland, folklore, superstition and magic, and its role in Irish culture.

Assessment – Students will film and upload one of the following to their portfolio.

1: video – create a short video (2-3 mins) sharing a custom or tradition that is part of your culture, and what 'message' it might convey.

OR

2: video - create a short video (2 mins) re-enacting the practice of a traditional ritual, cure or superstition, dance or chant, and what its purpose is.

OR

3: video-create a short video (2-3 mins) Interview an older person who will share stories of mythology or folklore and what their meaning might be.

OR

4: Create an image slideshow, audio file, original poem, original song or a piece of art based on any traditional folk custom or myth. Include your explanation of how your work was inspired and how it is representative of this theme.

4 'A Stranger in my own land' Clearances and Colonization

Lecturer: Niamh Hamill Ph.D.

Class Topic

Colonization, clearance of land, use of resources and susceptibility to climate issues- the impacts of colonization – the treatment of, and attitudes to the poor.

D. Assessment – Students will film and upload one of the following to their portfolio.

1: 'My story' video – create a short video (2-3 mins) about yourself and any personal connection you have with migration or movement because of colonization or land clearance.

OR

2: 'Our story' video - create a short video (2 mins) telling the story of any colonizing or clearance that took place in the U.S.A.

OR

3: Their story' video – create a short video (2-3 mins) about any group of people you believe to be adversely affected by climate change, which is connected to colonization or clearance.

OR

4: Create an image slideshow, audio file, original poem, original song or a piece of art based on the theme of colonization, or land clearance. Include your explanation of how your work was inspired and how it is representative of this theme.

5 'A Modest Proposal' Addressing Poverty and Migration

Lecturer: Niamh Hamill Ph.D.

Class Topic

Using the story of the Irish Famine, we consider the treatment of poor people and migrants by wealthier nations.

2: Create a short video (2-3 mins) of an interview with somebody who is working to address poverty in your community.

OR

3: Create a short video of your response to the song 'City of Chicago' performed by Christy Moore https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=AvOcyRqNfBI

OR

4: Create an image slideshow, audio file, original poem, original song or a piece of art based on the theme of this topic. Include your explanation of how your work was inspired and how it is representative of this theme.

6 'Mná na hÉireann- The Women of Ireland

Lecturer: Niamh Hamill Ph.D.

Class Topic

We track the history of Irish women from the early 1900s through to contemporary Ireland.

Assessment – Students will film and upload one of the following to their portfolio.

- 1: 'My story' video create a short video (2-3 mins) about a female revolutionary that interests you, explaining why.
- 2: Create a short video of your response to the song 'Grace' performed by Jim McCann. Include what you have been able to find out about Grace Gifford, and if the song reflects her accurately. https://youtu.be/SMf6IvJI0e4

OR

3: Create a short video (2-3 mins) about a person or an event in recent history, with information that you believe should be more widely known — explain why.

OR

4: Create an image slideshow, audio file, original poem, original song or a piece of art based on the theme of this topic. Include your explanation of how your work was inspired and how it is representative of this theme.

7 'Sunday Bloody Sunday' - Civil Rights Campaigns in USA and Ireland

Lecturer: Niamh Hamill Ph.D.

Class Topic

This class will focus on the civil rights issues in Northern Ireland and their connection to the American Civil Rights movement by referencing the two Bloody Sunday events in USA and Ireland.

Site Visits & Interviews

Interview with Don Mullan, Derry native, witness to Bloody Sunday and author of 'Eyewitness: Bloody Sunday'.

<u>Assessment</u> – Students will film and upload one of the following to their portfolio.

1: 'My story' video – create a short video (2-3 mins) discussing, with a friend or family member, any story or memories of the Civil Rights movement in the USA.

OR

2: 'Border story' video - create a short video (2-3 mins) about any constructed border between two communities, and its impact.

OR

3: Create a short video (2-3 mins) of your response to the song 'Zombie' performed by The Cranberries Include what you have been able to find out about the context of the song. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=6Ejga4kJUts

OR

4: Create an image slideshow, audio file, original poem, original song or a piece of art based on the theme of this topic. Include your explanation of how your work was inspired and how it is representative of this theme.

8 'When Hope and History Rhyme' – The Northern Ireland Peace Process

Class Topic

OR

This class will focus on the Peace Process and Good Friday Agreement 1998

Introduction Professor Liam Kennedy, Director of the Clinton Institute, University College Dublin. Interview with Niall O'Dowd, leader of Irish American group who played a key part in the Irish Peace Process. Also includes clip of Mo Mowlam interview.

<u>Assessment</u> – Students will film and upload one of the following to their portfolio.

- 1: 'My story' video create a short video (2-3 mins) telling a story or interviewing someone in your family/friend circle who was involved in a conflict resolution event or meeting or activity.

 OR
- 2: 'Our story' video create a short video (2-3 mins) with a review of a movie that you believe promotes shared empathy and kindness. Highlight key moments in the movie.

 OR
- 3: Visit and create a video (2-3 mins) at any monument or memorial or museum that commemorates a gesture of peace or solidarity.
- 4: Create an image slideshow, audio file, original poem, original song or a piece of art based on the theme of this topic. Include your explanation of how your work was inspired and how it is representative of this theme.

Or

an Irish product or service that is available to you in the USA.

We would like you to upload a **video presentation** about any of the above, - an **interview** with someone connected with any of the above, or a **business profile** of the company, or a **profile of the service or product**, including why you think it is a successful enterprise. Please keep your video 1-2 mins in length, and you must present the video (profiles of business websites will not do – we need to see you discuss the specific business).

Any contemporary American writer that you think is making an important contribution to American Literary Culture. In your 1-2 min video, explain your reasons, and explain your reasons, with some references to the text.

Any writer from an ethnic minority that you think has made a significant impact on writing and literature. In your 1-2 min video, explain your reasons, and explain your reasons, with some references to the text.

Or

Video your own response to the interview you have watched with Paula Meehan. In your 1-2 min video, explain your reasons, with some references to her comments.

- 3: Video your response to any of our three guest speakers in the class today, Ailbhe Smyth, Femi Bankole or Senator Eileen Flynn. Please use comparisons with campaigns or social issues relevant in the U.S.
- OR 4: Create an image slideshow, audio file, original poem, original song or a piece of art based on the theme of this topic. Include your explanation of how your work was inspired and how it is representative of this theme

15. 'On the Road' Educational and Cultural Travel

Class Topic

Global adventures - The benefits of doing a study trip. How you should prepare to study abroad. How to address finance and the fear factor.

<u>Assessment</u> – Students will film and upload one of the following to their portfolio.

For your final assignment, I would like you to tell me where you would most like to travel, and why. In your video upload, you can use images or video clips, interviews or maps.
